



Vaccinations and Communicable Diseases

Stetson University College of Law has established this policy to communicate its requirements and expectations on vaccinations and to minimize the impact of communicable diseases and/or illnesses on the wellbeing of the campus community and the operation of the College of Law.

The College of Law, as a free-standing graduate professional school, does not generally require specific vaccinations or immunizations beyond those requirements that may be imposed by the U.S. or foreign governments for individuals traveling to or from foreign countries. For employees in certain occupations that may carry a risk of infection, vaccinations will be made available as appropriate in accordance with applicable safety plans. If the Dean determines that a public health situation has developed that warrants the implementation of mandatory vaccination or immunization requirements, those requirements will be communicated as quickly as possible.

The College of Law at all times reserves the right to take steps to limit or restrict an individual's access to campus and/or to require medical documentation as reasonably necessary to verify that an individual does not pose a substantial risk to the community due to communicable diseases.

Notwithstanding that vaccinations are typically not required, the College of Law believes it important to educate the campus about specific communicable diseases, including but not limited to meningococcal meningitis and hepatitis B.
