



Types of Residential Living Accommodations

- **Living Space Accommodations:** Accommodation considerations for students who have a confirmed Stetson Residential Living Agreement and will be (or are) assigned a space on campus. These accommodations could include private bedroom and/or bathroom, physical accessibility features, strobe light fire alarm, first floor access or access to an elevator, etc.
- **Emotional Support Animal (ESA):** An ESA is an animal that provides emotional support that alleviates one or more identified symptoms or effects of a person's disability. This accommodation is only allowed in the residence halls and the animal is not allowed in any other building on campus.
- **Service Animal:** A service animal, under the [Americans with Disabilities Act](#) is defined as a dog that has been individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of a person with a disability. The tasks the dog performs must be directly related to the individual's disability. Other species of animals, whether wild or domestic, trained or untrained, are not considered service animals. In the State of Florida, service animals are not required to be registered, therefore the service animal's owner does not have to request accommodations with accessibility services to bring the animal on campus. However, we do advise that they do so that we can give a heads up to faculty and staff as a courtesy regarding the animal's presence. No one can be barred from bringing a service animal on campus. Service animals are permitted in all buildings and spaces throughout campus.

To be approved for any Residential Living Accommodations a student must have documentation that meets the Residential Living Documentation Requirements referenced on the Accessibility Services Website.
