# Welcome to the June 2024 Residency

Dear Students, Guests, and Faculty of the MFAotA:

Welcome to Stetson!

For the first time in the MFA's seven-year history, we'll be holding our summer residency on Stetson's DeLand campus, named one of the most beautiful campuses of the South.

My hope, as always, is that you'll find this residency period a time of intense intellectual stimulation, creative cross-pollination, and community-building with a wonderful group of peers and mentors. To help with that, we've been working on a schedule and guest lineup that reflects our inter-arts mission and engagement with place and site-specificity. In particular, for this round, we've been leaning into our Floridian roots, with guests and guest artists who have a connection to Florida, either by hailing from, living in, studying, or producing art about our sunshine state.

To help get you familiar with the offerings of Stetson and DeLand more broadly, you'll find recommendations for things to do around town, including where to eat and some sites that may be interesting for the Free Day on Wednesday.

In the mornings you'll have core workshops from returning superstar faculty members Steven Dunn, Terri Witek and Cyriaco Lopes, as well as Vidhu Aggarwal, back to lead our graduating expanded field poets, and, for the first time, I'll be teaching the Prose Foundations course.

In the afternoons, we hope to introduce you to some new ways of thinking about writing and art with exploratory sessions from multi-genre writer Jeff Parker, the prolific and genre-bending Chesya Burke, visual artist Luca Molnar, and cherished faculty member Urayoán Noel. Plus we'll have some optional offerings including the submission party/Burrow Press Pop-up and a Next Steps talk for anyone interested in applying for teaching positions post-MFA.

In my discussion with students and in the survey I sent around when assuming the director-ship position, I heard about your ideas, your priorities and your enthusiasm for the prospect of holding a residency at Stetson. As this is our first time on campus, we're excited to see what new rhythms and patterns might emerge, which spaces will prove popular, and how we might change those spaces through engagement, or be changed by them.

I'm excited to be sharing this next step for the program with all of you.

## **About Stetson**

Stetson University was founded in 1883 as DeLand Academy, and later changed its name to Stetson in honor of John B. Stetson, a major donor and manufacturer of the Stetson hat (you can take a photo beside his curiously large statue near the fountain). The initial building, DeLand Hall, is still in use and is the oldest building in Florida in continuous use for higher education. In 1905, Stetson University College of Law was the first law school in Florida to admit women, and Stetson might also have been the first university to have co-ed residence halls. Until 1995, Stetson was a Baptist college but broke ties over social issues including drinking on campus and a change to how trustees were selected, which saw a relaxation of the requirement that three-quarters of the trustees be Baptist. Stetson is currently a private, not-for-profit institution unaffiliated with any particular religion.

Today, Stetson is rated a top four regional university and its DeLand campus has been named one of the most beautiful college campuses in the South. There are more than 2,500 undergraduate students enrolled in 55 undergraduate majors and minors, as well as 1,200 graduate students across 18 graduate programs.

The College of Arts & Sciences, home to the MFA, is the largest college on campus and has several nationally recognized programs, including English and Creative Writing, the Creative Arts department, and the School of Music, Florida's first collegiate school of music.

## **About DeLand**

DeLand is known for its vibrant main street, with its arts and antiques vibe. Stetson campus, just to the north, is only a few blocks away. On weekends, the downtown can fill up with visitors who come to poke around the shops, particularly during the Artisan Alley Farmers Market, every Friday night from 6-9pm and featuring over 40 vendors. Here's some of our favorite places to go downtown:

#### Food:

- Oudom Thai and Sushi: Very solid Thai food with a large sushi menu and good lunch specials. Vegan and gluten-free options available. Closed Sunday and Monday; open for lunch Tuesday to Saturday.
- De La Vega: A tapas restaurant for Latin fusion and sangria, including empanadas and hibiscus tacos. Can get busy so leave your name with reception and take a wander. Vegan and gluten-free options available. Closed Monday and Tuesday; open for lunch Thursday to Sunday.
- Urban Brick: Serviceable pizza with a patio. Gluten free and vegan options. Closed Tuesday and Wednesday; open for lunch on the weekends.
- Bake Chop: Good quality spot for salads, sandwiches, and bowls. Can get busy, especially for lunch. Vegan and gluten-free options available. Closed Sunday.
- Chica's Cuban Cafe: Traditional Cuban food with a big side patio, attached to the Artisan hotel. Vegan and gluten-free options available. Closed Monday and Tuesday.
- Santorini Greek Cuisine: Popular spot for Greek. Gluten-free but limited vegan options. Closed Sunday & Monday; open for lunch on the weekends.
- Parva Colombian Bakery & Restaurant: this one is a little further out so you'll need a car but worth it for the great bowls. Vegetarian options. Open 7 days a week.

#### **Drinks:**

- Trilogy Coffee: Your hipster barista pour-over spot. Has seating, a patio, and an industrial vibe.
- Boston Coffeehouse: cozier and cheaper than Trilogy, with a menu that includes pancakes and lots of sweet coffee with whipped cream-type offerings.
- Sidecar Market & Bar: A spot beloved by Stetson faculty, this "market & bar" is a strange beast. Equal parts antique furniture store, beer/wine bar and pop-up bakery, their logo is "shop, eat, drink!" and that sums it up. Vegan bakery options and the best ice chai in town. Vegan fair on Friday nights, including Big Mac Tacos. Serves Saturday and Sunday Brunch. Oysters on Sundays. Closed Mondays.
- Wanderbar: A craft cocktail bar with a seasonal cocktail menu and classic cocktails. Chill atmosphere in the early evenings and a favorite spot for late nights. Live music on the weekends.
- The Elusive Grape: by wine bar standards, this place is as unpretentious and approachable as it gets. Bills itself as "DeLand's living room". Wine flights with cheese pairings are available from Thursday-Saturday. Closed Mondays.
- Café Da Vinci: Younger spot for live music with a massive courtyard. Hosts a weekly pride night with drag shows on Tuesday. Check website for live music listings.

#### **Local Attractions:**

- African American Museum of the Arts: a small museum with a permanent collection and temporary
  exhibitions on display. Open late morning to afternoon on Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday.
- Athens Theatre: a restored historic theatre and the "crowned jewel of DeLand," this venue hosts live theatre and concerts throughout the year. Check the website for current events and listings.
- Cliff's Books: used books and comics in downtown DeLand. A local institution. Closed Sunday-Tuesday.
- Museum of Art: a gallery with temporary exhibitions. During the conference there will be an exhibition by Cuban-American artist Yolanda Sánchez, who does textile and painting works. Open late morning to late afternoon, Tuesday to Saturday, and afternoons on Sunday.
- Skydiving: DeLand is known as the skydiving capital of the world. There's a famous spot near the airport for anyone interested (and brave enough) https://skydivedeland.com/

### **Nearby Attractions:**

- Blue Springs State Park: famous for the manatees that come every winter and the natural springs that remain 72 degrees all year long, this is a great spot for kayaking and walking. Swimming is currently closed while the banks are restored. Note that parking fills early and there can be long waits by mid-day, with visitors turned away if the park is full.
- Cassadaga: this nearby town of spiritualists and mediums is the place to go if you're in need of a crystal or a fortune-teller. The old hotel in town has an Italian restaurant and a board with the contact information for all mediums accepting appointments that day.
- New Smyrna Beach: closest thing to a beach day near Stetson, this beach is nice to walk along but dangerous for swimming. Known as the shark bite capital of the world, it's a famous spot for surfing.

# **Arrival Info**

The closest major airport is Orlando International Airport (MCO). Alternatives include Sanford (SFB) and Daytona Beach (DAB) and although they are closer to Stetson, the expense of the regional airports can be prohibitive. Once you've arrived, all airports have Uber, Lyft, and taxi to get you to DeLand.

If driving, and staying at one of the dorms, please park at University Hall.

If attending but staying offsite, students can park in any of the lots for commuters or faculty/staff, but not student spaces, as those are reserved for summer students. See the Parking Map at the end of this guide for spots.

# Housing Info

All students who elected for Stetson Housing will be staying at University Hall, a former motel across the street from the main campus. All rooms have a private bathroom, WIFI, a desk/chair, adjustable A/C, and access to a paid laundry and a common room with a TV and a kitchen. **Parking:** Students can park in any of the lots for commuters or faculty/staff but not student spaces as those are reserved for summer students. See map at the end of the guide.

Hatter1 Card: All Stetson students must have a Hatter1 Card to access buildings and resources, including the gym and library. Jen Anders will distribute Hatter1 Cards at check-in. Do not lose these or you will be responsible for the replacement, including the replacement fee. Please hold onto your Hatter1 Card between semesters or you will once again be responsible for replacing the Hatter1 Card at your own expense and convenience.

**duPont-Ball Library:** As a Stetson student you have full library access, including the catalogues, media library, laptop-borrowing privileges and a 3D-printer. Hatter1 Card required.

## Health & Safety

Given that this is Florida in the summer, our largest concern will be the heat and the weather. Please drink plenty of water.

**Public Safety:** Stetson's public safety team is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. You can reach them at 386-822-7300. In the event of an emergency, please call 9-1-1

**Lightning:** Florida has regained the title as the state with the most lighting strikes. While on campus you might hear our slightly unnerving lightning siren. One blare means threat of lightning. Three blasts mean all clear.

**Stetson Health:** the on-campus doctor's office for non-emergency medical needs. This office is run in partnership with AdventHealth and provides primary care to students. Patients are seen by appointment and services are charged through health insurance. You can reach them at 386-822-8150 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4:30 p.m.

Advent Health DeLand: the main hospital in town. Open 24 hours. Available at 386-943-4522

**Covid-19:** Stetson University follows the current Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines for COVID-19. Therefore, this transfers decisions to personal responsibility for our faculty, staff and students to monitor for symptom development and self-isolate when needed, as per the CDC's COVID-19 Isolation Protocol.

- Students will be responsible for notifying their professors, the Program Director, and any close contacts of their isolation status. Employees will be responsible for notifying their supervisors and close contacts.
- If you test positive for COVID-19, stay home for at least 5 days and isolate from others in your home. You are likely most infectious during these first 5 days. Use the CDC's Isolation and Exposure calculator to assess your dates and for additional information on when to end isolation.
  - Please note: students who test positive are responsible for developing and executing their own isolation lodging and contingency plan. We suggest you do this ahead of arrival as the accommodations at Stetson may not be available past the end of the program dates. Any costs associated with isolation is the responsibility of the student, staff member or instructor.
- We continue to support mask wearing for those who prefer it and for those who are advised to wear one
  based on their immunocompromised status, but universal mask wearing is not required.
- The MFAotA strongly suggests that all MFA participants be fully vaccinated and encourages the latest booster at least two weeks ahead of arrival.

Marissa Rodriquez: Originally from the Bronx, New York, I moved to Debary, Florida, around the age of nine, which marked a significant shift in the media representation I saw. Ever since then, I've been writing stories and creating art about fierce, powerful, and unabashedly feminine brown women. It was during my undergrad that I discovered my passion for writing, and here in the MFA program—due to the encouragement of my classmates and teachers—the new chapter of my creative life has begun. Inspired by the works of Michael Dante DiMartino and Bryan Konietzko, Rebecca Sugar, Hayao Miyazaki, Daniela Strijleva, Glen Keane and so many more, I'm excited to see where my love for animated films, children's media, writing, and art come together to create something the little girl in me always wanted to see.

**Shaun O. Smith** is an American poet based in the Florida panhandle. He is recognized for ephemeral performances that experiment with discomfort and challenge a shift in perspectives. His work blends physical and immaterial elements to layer concepts across a multimedia canon. O. Smith also spends his time as a founder and curator of the poetry society Grass Routes.

**Bre'Anna Bivens**, or Bre', is a proud Houston, Texas native, and multi-disciplinary artist. She is a two-time Pushcart Prize nominee, and her work has been published in Guernica, Apricity Press, and is forthcoming elsewhere. Through her research, Bre' explores Black temporalities and pluralities, and how the grief therein creates new pathways to explore art. By transcending conventional notions of genre, she hopes her work provokes the senses, and repositions her audience to consider the interiority of Black lives in full tonality and hue.

# CORE FACULTY



Vidhu Aggarwal's poetry and multimedia practices engage with world-building in multiple platforms: poetry, video, and graphic media. In her poetry books, *The Trouble with Humpadori* (2016) *Daughter Isotope* (2021), she engages in a "cloud poetics," as a way of thinking about personal, collective, and digital archives. **Brendan Bowles** is a writer from Toronto, Ontario. His work has been published and produced for stage and radio and has won some of the largest short story awards in Canada. He was Wallace Stegner Fellow at Stanford University and a Fiction Fellow at the Fine Arts Work Center in Provincetown, Massachusetts. He is currently the Director of Stetson University's MFA of the Americas.



Steven Dunn, a.k.a Pot Hole (cuz he's deep in these streets) is the recipient of a 2021 Whiting Award, and the author of three novels: *Potted Meat* (2016), *water & power* (2018), and a *Tannery Bay* (2024), which is co-written with Katie Jean Shinkle. Potted Meat was a finalist for the Colorado Book Award, and shortlisted for Granta Magazine's Best of Young American Novelists, and adapted to a short film by Foothills Productions. The Usual Route has played at L.A. International Film Festival, Houston International Film Festival, and others. He was born and raised in West Virginia.



Brazilian-American artist Cyriaco Lopes has exhibited at the Museum of Modern Art in Rio de Janeiro, the Museum of Art of São Paulo (MASP), El Museo del Barrio in NYC, the Centre Wallonie Bruxelles in Paris, Casa Degli Artisti in Milan, among other international venues. In 2022 he had a solo exhibition at Satchel Projects in Chelsea, NYC. His work has been selected and curated in exhibitions by critics such as Yasufumi Nakamori, Paulo Herkenhoff and Adriano Pedrosa, as well as by artists such as Lygia Pape, Janine Antoni, Luciano Fabro, and Ryan Trecartin. He is the winner of the NYC World Studio Foundation Award, the Contemporary Art Museum Saint Louis Project Award, the São Paulo Phillips Prize of trip to Europe.

His performances with poet Terri Witek have been seen at the Centro Nacional de Cultura in Lisbon, Portugal, the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts in Philadelphia, the Salford Museum, in Manchester, England, the Atlantic Center for the Arts, FL, the Centre del Carme Cultura Contemporanea, in Valencia, Spain, and Oi Futuro Center for Art & Technology, in Rio, Brazil. Their collaboration was featured at the 2023 ARCO Madrid, where their gallery, The Liminal, won one of the two special mentions by the jury.

The artist holds two M.F.A.s: one in Imaging and Digital Arts, UMBC, Baltimore, and the other in Visual Languages, UFRJ, Rio de Janeiro. He attended artist's residencies such as Skowhegan, the London Project, MassMoca, and the MacDowell Colony (where Lopes was a 2019 Marian O. Naumburg Photography fellow).



Terri Witek's 8 books of poetry include her newest collection, Something's Missing in This Museum (2023); a new chapbook, Down Water Street is forth-coming in 2024 from aboveground press. Her work has been included in many anthologies, including 2 from 2021: JUDITH: Women Making Visual Poetry (Timglaset) and WAAVe (Women Asemic Artist and Visual Poets) Witek's art/text mixes are often featured in collaboration: she teaches Poetry in the Expanded Field in Stetson University's low-residency MFA of the Americas with Brazilian visual artist Cyriaco Lopes; they also lead The Fernando Pessoa Game at the Disquiet International Literary Program each summer in Lisbon. Their collaborative work has been represented at ARCO in Madrid and in Seoul, Chania (Crete), Miami, New York, Philadelphia, Lisbon, and Valencia, Spain. terriwitek.com

Luca Molnar (b. 1991, Budapest, Hungary) is a painter, most days. Her work uses historical figures and personal mythologies as its starting point, building networked connections through both research and intuition. In her paintings, pattern references imagined domestic spaces, allowing the private sphere to emerge as a complex and contradictory site worthy of our attention. Her interest in our relationships with the past, memory, and identity extends into her installation work and writing.

Molnar received her MFA from New York University and her BA in Studio Art from Dartmouth College. Recent exhibitions include The Beauty of Politics: Oscar Bluemner and Luca Molnar at the Hand Art Center (DeLand, FL); Helybe at alt\_space Gallery (New Smyrna Beach, FL); and Same Source at Art Center Sarasota (FL). Molnar is an Assistant Professor of Studio Art at Stetson University in DeLand, Florida.



Urayoán Noel is a Puerto Rican poet, scholar, translator, creative-nonfiction writer, and performer, and a 2022-2023 Letras Boricuas poetry fellow. His most recent books are the poetry collection Transversal (University of Arizona Press, 2021), which was named a Book of the Year by the New York Public Library and longlisted for the PEN Open Award, and, as translator, adjacent islands/ islas adyacentes (Ugly Duckling Presse/DoubleCross Press/ La Impresora, 2022), which collects two "camping books" by Puerto Rican poet and book artist Nicole Cecilia Delgado. A finalist for the National Translation Award, Noel has received the LASA Latino Studies Book Prize and an MLA Honorable Mention for his critical study In Visible Movement: Nuyorican Poetry from the Sixties to Slam (University of Iowa Press, 2014). His work has appeared in Poetry and the New York Times, and he has performed at Poesiefestival Berlin, Barcelona Poesia, and the Toronto Biennial of Art.



**Jeff Parker** is the author of several books including *Where* Bears Roam the Streets: A Russian Journal, the novel Ovenman, and the short story collection The Taste of Penny. His many collaborative books and anthologies include: Clean Rooms, Low Rates; Erratic Fire, Erratic Passion: The Poetry of Sportstalk; A Manner of Being: Writers on their Mentors; Rasskazy: New Fiction from a New Russia; Amerika: Russian Writers View the United States; and The Back of the Line. His short fiction and nonfiction have appeared in American Short Fiction, McSweeney's, Ploughshares, Tin House, and others. 

Currently home to the Religious Studies department, Allen Hall was built in 1950 by the Florida Baptist Convention at a time when the university had an affiliation with the Baptist denomination, which ended in the early 1990's.

The Carlton Student Union (CUB) serves as the center for student life on campus supporting students throughout their college experience. The CUB offers students multiple study and lounge locations, and provides four different food options to choose from.



Davis Hall was constructed in 1967 with the intentions of being a new home for the business school but is now home to several academic programs within the College of Arts and Sciences. It provides student lounge areas, dance studio, game room and a computer lab.



The duPont-Ball Library, the oldest federal depository in Florida, was built in 1964 and was extensively renovated in 1999. It now is home for the Innovation Center with 3D printing, the Writing Center, and the Hollis Family Student Success Center on the second floor.



Elizabeth Hall was the first major building on campus by university benefactor and namesake John B. Stelson, who named the building after his wife, Elizabeth Stelson. Today, Elizabeth Hall is home to the College of Arts and Sciences and also houses offices and Clasername.



Opened in 2009, the Homer and Dolly Hand Art Center houses the university's extensive art collection by Modernist painter Oscar Bluermer (1867–1938). It includes two galleries, one to exhibit the Vera Bluermer Kouba Collection and other works from the university's permanent art collection, and also includes special student juried art exhibitions.

The Cross-Cultural Center (Tri-C) is a second home and resource center for students from diverse social identities including race and ethnicity, sexuality, religion, socioeconomic status and ability.



Honoring alumnus Gary A. Meadows '59, the Meadows Alumni House is a welcome center fo Stetson Alumni and houses the staff from the Offices of Alumni Engagement and Annual



The recreational and wellness hub of campus life and club sports, the Hollis Center features an outdoor swimming pool, gymnasium (Rinker Field House), a lounge and fitness, activity and game rooms. The center's name honors the Hollis Tamily, Four generation of the family have been involved in the life of Stetson University.



The Eugene M. and Christine Lynn Business Center (LBC) is Stetson University's and Florida's first LEED-certified building. The School of Business Administration building features state-of-the-art technology and is home to the Roland George Investments Program, the Centurion Sales Program, and the Entrepreneurship and Accounting Program.



Brown Hall, constructed throughout 2023 was funded to create spaces that vallatile videas and learning to evolve into ground-breaking discoveries and innovative pedagogy. It is now home to the Center of Oplimal Health Across Lifespan, Environmental Science and Studies, and much more.



Home to one of the finest undergraduate music schools in the country, students are educated by artist faculty, using cutting-edge music technology that provides firstclass performing opportunities in symphony orchestra, band, choirs, opera, nusical theater, jazz, chamber music and solo.



The Sage Science Center is home to Stetson's Biology, Chemistry and Physics departments. The building was recently renovated to include exhibition spaces for undergraduate research, larger laboratory study areas and state-of-the-art technology.



DeLand Hall opened on Oct. 13, 1884, making it the oldest building in Florida that has been in continuous use for higher education. It was first academic building at Stetson's DeLand campus.



The RELC is a space constructed to complement the Earth- and environmental-science mission of the Gillespie Museum. The space is used by local students, environmental groups and Stetson students for presentations, demonstrations, meetings, lectures, workshops and special events.




Flagler Hall was financed and built in 1902 by railway magnate Henry M. Flagler. What originally housed the engineering program and Florida's first law school is now home for departments in the College of Arts and Sciences.



The new, three-story, 24,000 square-foot Marshall and Vera Lea Rinker Welcome Center welcomes our prospective students and their parents to campus, assisting current students and welcoming alumni back to campus.



Built in 1908, Sampson Hall is one of the most architecturally significant buildings on campus. Partially funded by grants from Andrew Carnegie and Elizabeth Stetson, the building includes classrooms for Art, Modern Languages, American Studies, and art studios





#### A Long History of Significance

A Long History of Significance
New York entrepreneur Henry A. DeLand played a
leading role in establishing the city of DeLand and
founded the university as DeLand Academy in 1876.
Thirteen students started classes in a rented building
in 1883. The following year, Mr. DeLand erected
a building at the corner of Woodland Boulevard
and Minnesota Avenue to house classrooms and
administrative offices. That building, now known
as DeLand Hall, is the oldest building in Florida to
be used continuously for higher education. After
experiencing financial difficulties in the late 1880s,
Mr. DeLand found it impossible to support the
university. He turned to Philadelphia hatmaker John
Batterson Stetson, who had recently built a winter
home in DeLand. Mr. Stetson provided much-needed
funding for the new institution, and in 1887, John
B. Stetson was elected to the university's Board of
Trustees. In 1889, the institution was renamed in his
honor as Stetson University.
