THE DÉJÀ VU—MINING EXPERIENTIAL ECHOES

"the déjà vu is not not a strip club in ypsilanti." Indeed, the déjà vu encompasses a pattern of doubling (double negatives, double consciousness, double time) and an investigation of "embodying gestures repeating." Drawing on my black feminist practice in experimental memoir, poetry, and performance, we will consider what is "already seen" (déjà vu) in our work: what repeats, what persists, what recurs (across forms, texts, and bodies). We will trace overlaps and hauntings. We will explore formal and ancestral repetition. We will read, write, play, rewrite, revise, chant, channel, and move. We will mine experiential echoes on and off the page.

SEQUENCE BUILDING AND AFFECTIVE DESCRIPTION

In this workshop we will think about how your writing examines its embedded and embodied patterns of thought and affect through description and documentation. To quote Matthew Arthur and his definition of Affect Studies "The word "affect" holds a glut of meanings in generative drift: from emotion, feeling, mood, sensation, and vibe to action, atmosphere, capacity, force, intensity, potential, or relation. Affect studies attend to those near-imperceptible, too-intense, interstitial, or in-the-making visceral forces and feelings that accompany and broker the entangled material—especially bodily—and conceptual potentials of an emergent or historical phenomenon..." We are going to think about the patterns of description and "near-imperceptible" states of feeling that accrue and make your writing vibrant.

For this place-based encounter, we will be visiting two art sites in DeLand: the African American Museum of the Arts (AAMA) and artist Luca Molnar's studio. Both AAMA and Molnar engage history (always present) as part of their curatorial and creative work. As a non-profit organization founded by Black women, the AAMA is a space for collaboration and education, with a stated purpose of creating "appreciation and understanding of African American and Caribbean American art and culture." We will be hearing from Mary Allen, Executive Director, about the history of the museum and surrounding Spring Hill community, and about the museum's collections and ongoing projects. After, we will visit Luca Molnar's private studio, also based in DeLand. As an artist and educator, Molnar has collaborated with AAMA on community projects (we will see one such project: the Moses Sun mural at the Thin Man Watts Amphitheater). Molnar's individual practice traces patterns in storied matter, while considering issues of "past, memory, and identity." As Molnar writes about her paintings: "Pattern references imagined domestic spaces, allowing the private sphere to emerge as a complex and contradictory site worthy of our attention." During these site visits, we will be moving between public and private designations, while considering what it means to "place" a location, and how and what patterns are given attention and space. (Note: Those with meal plans will be provided a box lunch. Those without a meal plan may purchase food on the trip.)
