

Letter from the Interim Director:

Dear Writers and Creators of the MFAotA:

I am thrilled to present the program guide and schedule for our Winter 2023 residency and to be welcoming you back as a member of our writing community—or to be greeting you for the first time as a new instructor or student.

In the following pages you'll find important information about our upcoming residency at the Atlantic Center for the Arts (the ACA), including general information, bios for our new and returning faculty and guests, a schedule, maps, contact info, housing information, and more.

For those returning, you'll also notice some changes throughout the program—some large and some small. As someone who has gone through a lot of changes this year, including switching jobs and moving countries, I know that change can sometimes feel destabilizing. But change is also—and always—a chance for new opportunities, for growth and connection.

With a new interim director and a new program coordinator in Jen Anders, there was always going to be some new ideas and new approaches, but I wanted to take direction with these new energies from the students and the teachers who already know this program, who make it the remarkable and unique community that it is. For that reason, the first thing I did upon landing in this wonderful new role was to ask current students and faculty about their experiences in the program. I wanted a sense of what we as a community value, what we wish to preserve going forward, as well as where we as a community could do better, what we might like more of, and in what directions we might like to see the program evolve.

With that in mind, I tried to honor two the most pressing requests I heard: to make the program more condensed for those taking time away from work and childcare, and to allow for more free time in the design of the scheduling. I've heard you on both counts and you'll see that represented below, with a shortened residency schedule and a free day in the middle to gather and head to the beach if you so wish, or to retreat and recharge, to write and reflect.

I've also leaned into the enthusiasm that I heard for the afternoon workshops, which represented to many a chance to explore interarts experimentation and to come together in different formulations of community, to work with new instructors and alongside peers whose work you might otherwise not encounter. With that in mind, we've expanded the afternoon workshops into two sessions, representing an exciting batch of established writers and artists who are sure to challenge you to grow and to change in relationship to your own work, with new instructors that include Kristen Arnett, Derrick Austin, and Lydia Conklin.

But in all these changes, we don't want to lose the things that makes us special. And so no program would be complete without Publishing Coordinator Ryan Rivas and the tech goddess Shelby Smotherman, both back in the saddle. And of course, we'll need our tremendous returning faculty, whose commitment to your growth and success remains unwavering: Steven Dunn and Stephanie Sauer in prose; Cyriaco Lopes, Urayoán Noel, and Terri Witek, offering poetry in the expanded field.

Above all, I hope you'll see a program that is exciting, one designed to challenge and support you, combining the people, places and ideas that you value (or will come to value, for those just joining us), alongside a few new tweaks—all with the goal of enriching your experience.

INTERNET

Wireless internet is available in all housing units and in the Leeper Studio Complex. The password is **atlantic** (all lowercase)

SECURITY

All residency participants are responsible for the security of all buildings. If you are the last person to leave a building, please lock the door as you leave. Also, please turn off all lights, appliances, computers, and electronics. Everyone in the residency will know the building codes so lock the doors, even if you plan to be back in a few minutes.

STUDIOS SPACES AND SHARED RESOURCES

Please keep shared spaces organized and available for the use of others. If you are finished using an ACA computer, please save your documents and close the programs that you were using so the next person can start working without worry. Please don't take mice and keyboards from shared computers, we have additional ones that you can borrow.

EQUIPMENT

Due to the ever-changing needs of artists, we STRONGLY encourage artists to bring items or equipment that is specialized to their practice.

ALSO, we STRONGLY encourage artists to bring their own technology, especially technology that is required for production or directly necessary for their practice.

ACA has many items and pieces of equipment available for artists to use during their residency. Many of the items listed are housed in their various studio locations. Some items/equipment are kept under lock and key in the Main Office, or in a studio locked closet. If you require an item or piece of equipment, please contact tech goddess Shelby Smotherman for assistance.

We ask that all artists return equipment to its rightful home after use.

CELLPHONES

Please be aware that cell phone signal (coverage) is very spotty on ACA property. Some carriers have better connections than others. Other solutions for making calls while on our property:

- Make sure the settings on your phone are set to WI-FI calling
- Use WhatsUp Application by downloading from Apple's App Store or Google Play

MAIL & SHIPPING

Mail is placed on the table at the entrance to the Whatmore Commons around lunchtime (Mon-Sat). It is each artist's responsibility to check for mail. There is an outgoing mailbox in the office copy room. We can help you answer questions about shipping items in the office. For shipping, we prefer UPS, as we have had trouble with FedEx pickups. You are responsible for packing your boxes and purchasing shipping (UPS recommended).

SMOKING

Smoking indoors is prohibited at Atlantic Center for the Arts. Please smoke outdoors and away from the entrances to ACA's buildings. Please dispose of your cigarette butts in the concrete containers located around the campus and not in the flammable brush.

PETS

No pets are allowed at ACA or in housing. Please contact us if you have a service animal or other questions about this policy.

OUTDOOR COOKING / FIRES

Cooking outdoors or any type of fire is prohibited.

BICYCLES

There are approximately 8 bicycles for you to use that are normally located in the back of the Sculpture Studio. The lock code is **1414**. Please use these for trips outside of ACA's campus and not to go on the boardwalks or from building to building.

RECYCLING & TRASH

ACA recycles all clean paper, cardboard (not pizza boxes), glass, plastic, and metal containers. Please place all recyclables in the blue containers in the studios or in your room. The recycling dumpster is located across from unit 28 and is outside of the fenced area. The non-recyclable garbage dumpster is located inside the fenced area.

WHATMORE COMMONS (DINING HALL)

As a communal space, the kitchen and facility should be treated with appropriate care and cleanliness. The Commons is equipped with commercial appliances. No utensils or glasses should be removed from the facility.

ARTIST HOUSING

ACCOMMODATIONS

ACA Artist Housing consists of 24 individual units and 4 accessible suites divided into two wings. Each individual unit is equipped with a full-size bed, work desk, chair, radio alarm clock, refrigerator and private bathroom with shower. Bed and bath linens are also provided. If you have a favorite pillow, you might want to bring that. The four accessible units also include a pull-out sofa for a caretaker as well as other features for those with disabilities. The rooms do not have a telephone or TV, but wifi access is available. Password: atlantic (all lowercase)

No guests are permitted in the housing units.

Housekeeping services are not provided during the Residency. Housekeeping items such as toilet paper, soap, and basic cleaning supplies can be found in the laundry room cabinet.

Cooking is not allowed in the housing units; however, the Whatmore Commons (detailed above) is accessible 24/7.

LAUNDRY

Laundry facilities (a washer and dryer) are located next to Unit 15 at the Housing facility. Each machine requires four quarters for each use. We can make change in the main office during business hours. ACA also sells single load detergent packets that cost \$0.50 each.

CHECKOUT PROCEDURES

CHECK-OUT SUNDAY, DECEMBER 17 BY 12:00 NOON

HOUSING

Remove all items from the refrigerator. You can bring sealed or unexpired food items to the commons that other artists can use.

Discard all garbage and recyclables in the appropriate dumpsters (located opposite unit 28, dumpster outside fence is for recycling, dumpster inside of fence is for non-recycling garbage).

Please put the air conditioner on a cool setting at 78 degrees or number 3.

Place your unit key on the counter.

Please turn off all lights.

Lock all windows and lock the door upon final exit.

STUDIO SPACES

Discard all garbage and recyclables in the appropriate dumpsters. The recycling dumpster is located across from unit 28 and is outside of the fenced area. The dumpster located inside the fence is for non-recycling garbage.

All artwork is the associate's responsibility. All preparation for shipping and all arrangements for shipping must be made prior to your departure.

ACA is not liable for any items left in the studios or digital files left on ACA computers.

Return any other items you may have moved or borrowed to their original location.

Safety Measures for the 2023 Residency at the ACA

On behalf of the students and faculty of the Stetson MFA program, the following protocols will be set in place at the upcoming Winter residency.

This nine-day residency will include approximately 30 participants, including approximately 17 MFA students, 5 faculty members, 4 staff members, and 5 guests who will be arriving from across the country and a few international locations.

Some local community members will be invited to attend evening events.

Most residency attendees will be able to remain on the ACA campus for the duration of the residency, but others may commute from home or off-site hotels. The residency events will include group workshops, readings, meals, and free time to socialize.

The MFAotA will abide by the COVID safety measures set in place by the ACA and Stetson University. This document has been created in collaboration with the ACA. We propose the following measures to ensure compliance with ACA and university policies:

- Stetson University follows the current Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines for COVID-19. Therefore, this transfers decisions to personal responsibility for our faculty, staff and students to monitor for symptom development and self-isolate when needed, as per the CDC's COVID-19 Isolation Protocol.
- Students will be responsible for notifying their professors, the Program Director, and any close contacts of their isolation status. Employees will be responsible for notifying their supervisors and close contacts.
- If you test positive for COVID-19, stay home for at least 5 days and isolate from others in your home. You are likely most infectious during these first 5 days. Use the <u>CDC's Isolation and Exposure calculator</u> to assess your dates and for additional information on when to end isolation.
 - Please note: students who test positive are responsible for developing and executing their own isolation lodging and contingency plan. We suggest you do this ahead of arrival as the accommodations at the ACA may not be available past the date of Stetson's original booking. Any costs associated with isolation is the responsibility of the student, staff member or instructor.
 - We continue to support mask wearing for those who prefer it and for those who are advised to wear one based on their immunocompromised status, but universal mask wearing is not required.
 - The MFAotA strongly suggests that all MFA participants be fully vaccinated and encourages the latest booster at least two weeks ahead of arrival.

For any life-threatening medical emergencies, participants should immediately dial 911.

For non-life-threatening medical emergencies:

- ACA staff can provide assistance with calling clinics or doctor's offices and help to arrange the use of the ACA van or call a taxi service, during office hours: M-F 9am-5pm and Saturday 10am-2pm. If a participant needs transportation outside of office hours or on the weekends, they should request a Uber, Lyft or a taxi.
- All participants please inform MFA faculty/staff who will then proceed to inform ACA staff of any COVID-19 related health situations and medical emergencies that take place on campus.

Lydia Conklin has received a Stegner Fellowship, four Pushcart Prizes, a Rona Jaffe Foundation Writer's Award, a Creative Writing Fulbright in Poland, a grant from the Elizabeth George Foundation, work-study and tuition scholarships from Bread Loaf, and fellowships from MacDowell, Yaddo, Emory University, Hedgebrook, Djerassi, the James Merrill House, Lighthouse Works, and elsewhere. Their fiction has appeared in *The Paris Review, One Story, McSweeney's, American Short Fiction,* and *VQR*. They have drawn cartoons for *The New Yorker* and *Narrative Magazine*, and graphic fiction for *The Believer, Lenny Letter,* and the Steppenwolf Theater in Chicago. They've served as the Helen Zell Visiting Professor at the University of Michigan and are currently an Assistant Professor of Fiction at Vanderbilt University. Their story collection, *Rainbow Rainbow,* was longlisted for the PEN/Robert W. Bingham Award and The Story Prize. Their novel, *Songs of No Provenance,* is forthcoming in 2025 from Catapult in the US and Chatto in the UK.

CYRIACO LOPES



Brazilian-American artist Cyriaco Lopes has exhibited at the Museum of Modern Art in Rio de Janeiro, the Museum of Art of São Paulo (MASP), El Museo del Barrio in NYC, the Centre Wallonie Bruxelles in Paris, Casa Degli Artisti in Milan, among other international venues. In 2022 he had a solo exhibition at Satchel Projects in Chelsea, NYC. His work has been selected and curated in exhibitions by critics such as Yasufumi Nakamori, Paulo Herkenhoff and Adriano Pedrosa, as well as by artists such as Lygia Pape, Janine Antoni, Luciano Fabro, and Ryan Trecartin. He is the winner of the NYC World Studio Foundation Award, the Contemporary Art Museum Saint Louis Project Award, and the São Paulo Phillips Prize of trip to Europe.

His performances with poet Terri Witek have been seen at the Centro Nacional de Cultura in Lisbon, Portugal, the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts in Philadelphia, the Salford Museum, in Manchester, England, the Atlantic Center for the Arts, FL, the Centre del Carme Cultura Contemporanea, in Valencia, Spain, and Oi Futuro Center for Art & Technology, in Rio, Brazil. Their collaboration was featured at the 2023 ARCO Madrid, where their gallery, The Liminal, won one of the two special mentions by the jury.

The artist holds two M.F.A.s: one in Imaging and Digital Arts, UMBC, Baltimore, and the other in Visual Languages, UFRJ, Rio de Janeiro. He attended artist's residencies such as Skowhegan, the London Project, MassMoca, and the MacDowell Colony (where Lopes was a 2019 Marian O. Naumburg Photography fellow).

His most recent books are the poetry collection Transversal (University of Arizona Press, 2021), which was named a Book of the Year by the New York Public Library and longlisted for the PEN Open Award, and, as translator, adjacent islands/islas advacentes (Ugly Duckling Presse/DoubleCross Press/La Impresora, 2022), which collects two "camping books" by Puerto Rican poet and book artist Nicole Cecilia Delgado. 

A Macondo Writers Workshop fellow, his work has appeared in *The Believer, The Rumpus, Literary Hub, Best American Nonrequired Reading 2012*, and elsewhere.



Shelby Smotherman is a writer, artist, and theatrical technician working in the Tampa Bay Area. Most often, she works with paint and lighting and uses language from her technical background to fill her poetry, as well as taking heavy influence from pop culture.


