SCALE OF U.S. SEIZURES



From January 1999—February 2019:

- Approx. 407,500 illegally trafficked individual animals seized
- Approx. 6,600 animals dead on arrival
- Approx. 40% of live animal seizures are corals
- Frequent seizures in Florida ports, especially Miami

Shipments of Live Animals Seized by USFWS 1999-2018




INITIAL DETERMINATION

deemed to be harmful "to human beings, to the interests of agriculture, horticulture, forestry, or to wildlife or the wildlife resources of the United States."



TAKE-AWAYS

- High Death Rates
- No Resources for Long-Term Care
- Common animals hard to find homes for
- Animals Rarely Freed



FLORIDA SUCCESS STORY

- More than 600 turtles returned to the wild
- 300 of those freed turtles now part of long-term monitoring & research project
- Two dozen more turtles released after quarantine for illness
- Small number of non-native turtles retained by captive wildlife licensee

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
