OLD LAWS AND NEW HEALTH THREATS

Cyanobacteria has blossomed worldwide with industrial agriculture, global warming, and the need to store water in reservoirs that have no natural marshes. It is so new, so toxic, and so frightening that public officials have had trouble dealing with its impacts. As the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers tries to create a new Lake Okeechobee management schedule and the state and federal partnership continues to implement the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan (CERP), laws and policies and very real public health threats collide and confuse the process.
