Sanctions

FOR TITLE IX DEPUTIES, ADVISORS, AND HEARING OFFICERS

What are "Sanctions"?

- Sanctions are what some may refer to as punishments;
- They are the consequences to being found responsible in the process;
- They can be arrived at through both informal or formal process
- They can be one or more requirements placed on the individual found responsible of the start of the start

According to Stetson's Code of Community Standards:

"We aim to foster student growth and development through providing students university expectations, helping them be reflective of individual and community accountability in their actions, and provide consequences grounded in education."

The basics of sanctions

They should fit the violation

- They should align with similar sanctions for similar situations
- They should take into account the ability of the complainant to access Stetson programs (education, work, etc.)
- They are in addition to any sanctions imposed by athletics teams, Greek organizations, Clubs, end, per those entities operating procedures fitte IX

Differences between DeLand & COL:

- There are some differences between sanctions specified at DeLand and the Stetson COL in Gulfport;
- Some of this is because of the nature of the student body, ABA requirements, and the culture of the campus;
- There are some basic similarities, however, as seen on the chart included with this module;
- Note that the COL publishes the violation & sanction (NOT the names) each year.

Sanctions exist on a spectrum...

From educational activities (watching a film, reading, then writing a response)

- ► To community service
- To prohibition from participating in certain events/activities

To probation for a specified time period

- To suspension for a specified time period
 To Evolution from the institution
 Stetson University
- ► To Expulsion from the institution

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Probation, Suspension, and Expulsion

May require the completion of additional activities (counseling, evaluations, completion of writing assignments, etc.)

Suspensions can be for the remainder of time the complainant is a student, but always require application for re-admittance

Expulsion can allow for re-admittates with pertainty requirements
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An important note about "disciplinary probation"

- By definition, this is "an encumbrance on the student's good standing at the University" where any subsequent violation may result in immediate separation from the University.
- This is for a specified fixed term of not less than 3 months of enrollment
- This option can limit what a student can be involved in on campus
- Specifics are often left up to the party that supervises the student's activity or job
- This can also apply to a virtual student

An important change with current situation:

The University can now utilize an option to only suspend a student from campus

This is new for the institution, where a student would be limited to only virtual course offerings and is not permitted to live in the residence halls, work on campus, or attend events (even virtual ones)

Title IX & Sanctions Specific Requirements:

- US Dept. of Ed requires us to publish the possible sanctions as part of the policy so they are included;
- No-Contact Orders are not considered punitive by the University, and are mutual orders;
- The focus of sanctions is to remedy the situation including ensuring access to University programs (this includes classes, employment, clubs), prevent future incidents, and promote an appropriate campus environment.

It is important that parties understand potential sanctions

- The Title IX Coordinator will discuss when meeting with students;
- Sanctions are different for employees there are significantly fewer options;
- Advisors can discuss sanctions with parties;
- A party who accepts responsibility may still have sanctions;
- If appeal overturns any sanctions, the University will work to restore the individual's standing (usually with groups, classes, clubs, etc.)

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What if sanctions aren't completed?

Students are informed that if sanctions aren't completed (including missing meetings) the University can take additional action

A "hold" can be placed on the student's account for class registration
