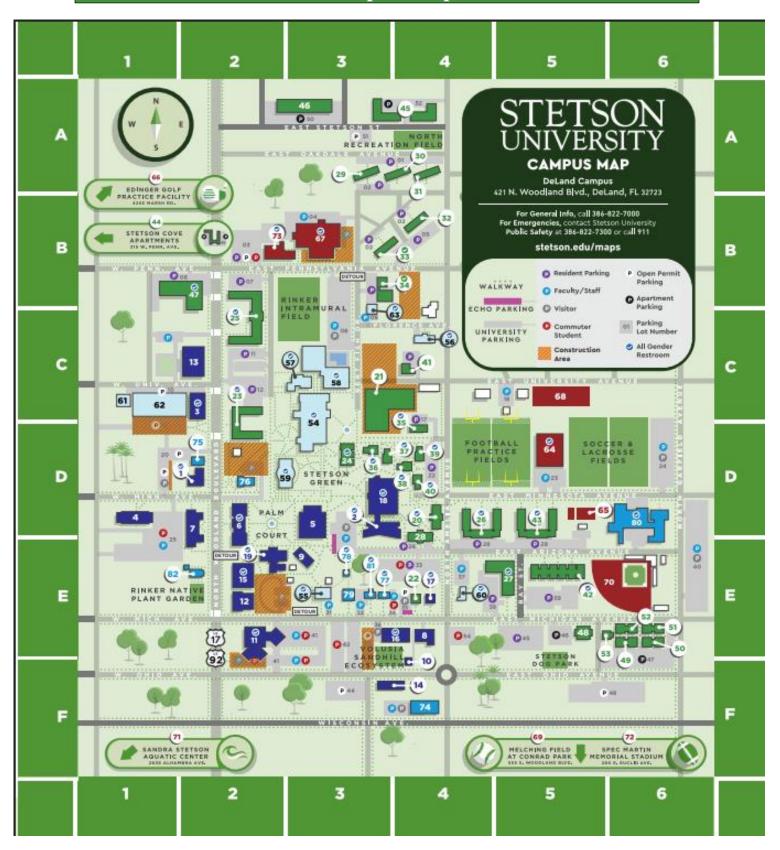

Brown 101 (Teaching Kitchen) Feeding the feed: Cooking, media, and the stories our food tells

Sarah Cramer, Stetson University

Food media – from TikTok recipe hacks to glossy food magazines – shapes how we cook, what we crave, and what we think is "good food." This workshop explores the intersection of cooking, media, and values. Participants will meet in the Brown Hall teaching kitchen to prepare a recipe that has gone viral on social media (e.g., baked feta pasta, mug cakes, dalgona coffee) alongside a simple dish made from ingredients found in the teaching garden. Before, during, and after cooking, participants will reflect on how food media trends influence factors ranging from ingredient availability to food waste. After tasting both dishes, participants will discuss what messages food media sends about identity, culture, and accessibility — and how to critically engage with that media. The session will conclude with a hands-on media activity: participants will design their own short "values-aligned" recipe post for Instagram or TikTok that tells a story about food justice, sustainability, or cultural awareness. Participants will leave with a deeper understanding of food media's power – and how they can use it for positive change.

Brown 139 Marking What Matters: Tattoos, Wellness, and Self-Expression

Lauren Hancock Christine Young

Tattoos are more than body art — they are living expressions of identity, memory, and values. This workshop invites participants to explore tattoos as a way of "letting your life speak" by reflecting on the stories, beliefs, and commitments that matter most. Facilitated in collaboration between Wellness and Recreation and Counseling Services, the session blends creativity, conversation, and play to

encourage deep reflection in a fun and supportive space. Participants will begin by examining tattoos as values in action, considering how tattoos can symbolize love, resilience, healing, or cultural connection. They will then engage in an interactive design activity where they sketch a tattoo that represents a core value or meaningful experience. Building on this, the group will play "Would You Ink It?", a lighthearted but thoughtful game that encourages participants to imagine and share tattoo ideas tied to their personal values, identities, or aspirations. By combining art, dialogue, and storytelling, this session highlights tattoos as both a personal and cultural language of meaning. Participants will leave with a design that reflects their values and new insights into how everyday choices (like tattoos) can align with authentic living.

Brown 140 Love Shouldn't be a Horror Story

Mia Martinez, Peer Advisory Council on Title IX

This workshop uses carefully selected scenes from horror and thriller films to ignite meaningful discussions about love, boundaries, and the core values that shape healthy relationships. Participants will critically examine how popular media frequently romanticizes toxic or abusive behaviors—such as obsession, jealousy, emotional manipulation, and control—and explore how these portrayals can distort real-life expectations about what love looks like. The workshop combines film analysis with guided group discussions, reflective exercises, and interactive activities to help attendees identify common red flags, debunk harmful relationship myths, and articulate their own values around respect, consent, and care. By connecting media representations to personal experiences, the session encourages participants to think critically about how cultural narratives influence their choices and relationships. Finally, the workshop offers practical tools and resources to support building relationships grounded in empathy, mutual respect, and authentic communication, fostering a community that reflects shared values of safety and support.

Brown 234 A Healthy and Vibrant Nation - "Let Your Life Speak"

The United States ranks 40th in the Global Health Index—a concerning statistic that demands action. However, this decline is reversible, and each of us can contribute to the solution. This interactive workshop explores pathways to elevate America's health ranking to the top five globally. Participants will engage in candid dialogue about current health challenges and discover how institutions like Stetson University's Brown Hall Center of Excellence for Health & Innovation can catalyze transformative change. Through collaborative discussion, attendees will examine practical strategies and innovations that can create a healthier, more vibrant nation. Join us to be part of this essential conversation and movement toward national health transformation.



Elizabeth Healing Beyond Platitudes: Christian Faith and Mental Health in Balance 315 Garrett Graves, Stetson University

This session explores the intersection of Christian faith and mental health with a focus on understanding and avoiding spiritual bypass—the tendency to use religious language or practices to sidestep difficult emotions and struggles. While prayer, scripture, and spiritual practices can be powerful resources, they can sometimes be misused as a way of avoiding deeper psychological pain rather than addressing it. Together, we will unpack what spiritual bypass looks like, why it happens, and how it can unintentionally hinder emotional and spiritual growth.

Participants will learn practical strategies to recognize when they might be bypassing, as well as techniques for engaging emotions in healthy, faith-integrated ways. Drawing on scripture, psychological tools, and real-life applications, this session emphasizes that embracing our feelings honestly is not a lack of faith, but an essential part of spiritual maturity and healing.

Learning Center (RELC)

Rinker Env. Action for a Greener Future

Given that the Earth and the living things it supports provide humans with the air we breathe, water we drink, energy we consume, and resources we use to make our lives more convenient, we should all ask what we can do to reduce our impact. This Values Day workshop, co-hosted by the Environmental Fellows and the Volusia Sandhill at the Gillespie Museum, will allow participants to act on their desire to live more sustainably by exploring their interests in sustainable living.

The Environmental Fellows will lead a discussion about the life cycle of human trash and provide students a chance to recycle trash into a useable craft. In the Volusia Sandhill, students will participate in seed collection and planting while learning about the role of small habitat fragments, including residential yards, in conserving biodiversity.

Leading with Conviction: How Your Beliefs Shape Your Leadership

Jill Arlaud Holmes, Residential Living & Learning

Leading with Conviction explores how our deepest beliefs—whether rooted in religious faith, philosophical traditions, cultural values, or personal convictions—shape our approach to leadership and community service. This interactive workshop examines the universal challenge of leading with integrity: How do we stay true to our core values across different contexts? How do we avoid compartmentalizing our beliefs from our actions?

The session begins with the presenter sharing how Christian faith informs their leadership as one example of values-based living. Participants will then engage in guided reflection to identify their own "north star"—the beliefs, principles, or worldview that guides their decisions, whether derived from Christianity, Islam, Judaism, Buddhism, Hinduism, secular humanism, or personal philosophy. Through individual reflection activities, cross-worldview dialogue, and small group discussions, participants will explore how their convictions inform their leadership style, decision-making, and sense of purpose.

By the end of this workshop, participants will have articulated their core beliefs, examined alignment between values and actions, and developed strategies for leading authentically in service to their communities—regardless of their faith background or worldview

CUB Student Bridging Lives: Lessons from the Film "Bridge to Terabithia" Lounge (280) Natalie McCoy, Stetson University

This session invites the Stetson University community to join the J. Ollie Edmunds Scholars in a Values Day tradition of a special movie screening and collaborative dialogue, this year inspired by the 2007 film adaptation of the classic coming-ofage children's book, "Bridge to Terabithia." Participants will consider how education, childhood, friendships, and families can both instill and challenge personal values, as well as how the imagination can help to create worlds that reflect these values. Authentic leaders are known for their ability to identify and bring from imagination to life a community's shared values with integrity. They speak for those whose lives can no longer do so with humility. This sort of leadership requires not only creativity, but also courage and—sometimes—second chances. Through film excerpts, guided discussion, and a "build-your-own-bridge" craft, this session aims to teach participants to build bridges that welcome others into their own values and ideal worlds, or "Terabithias," both within the Stetson University community and beyond.

Sage 218 Work Beyond Self: Servant Leadership in Action

Matthew Rhoads, Stetson University

In a culture that often measures work by personal achievement and advancement, it is easy to forget that true leadership is not about serving ourselves, but about serving others. Drawing from The Way of the Shepherd by Kevin Leman and William Pentak, this session will explore the principles of servant leadership and how they can be applied in our studies, careers, and community life.

The presentation will highlight practical lessons such as knowing your flock, making your pasture safe, and leading with humility, showing how each reflects Stetson's values of personal and social responsibility. Participants will be invited to consider how their choices, actions, and work can directly benefit others and contribute to the greater good.

The session will conclude with an open Q&A, giving space for participants to engage with the principles of servant leadership in their own context and walk away with practical steps to live out leadership grounded in service.

Sage 222 Manly Meaning: Aligning Your Life with Your Values

Joseph Ortiz, Stetson University

Dulce Barrera, Stetson University – Student Counseling Services

This 75-minute interactive workshop invites students to explore how male-identifying peers and their own daily choices reflect the world they hope to help create. Building on the theme "Let Your Life Speak," participants will identify their core values using a live poll, learn key insights about men's mental health, and complete a guided "Values → Actions" exercise to uncover gaps between their values and current behaviors.

Specific to the topic of men's mental health, students will explore what defines being manly, cultural messages received by men to hide emotions or "tough it out", and discuss barriers to help-seeking behavior.

Small group discussions will foster peer connection and normalize conversations about men's mental well-being. Each participant will leave with one clear, value-aligned action step they can implement immediately in their campus or personal life. By moving beyond reflection to tangible practice, this workshop supports authentic leadership, destigmatizes mental health, and strengthens our community's shared commitment to living our values together.

Lynn Business Center 220

Safer Sex Jeopardy: Living Our Values Through Sexual Health Stetson University WELL Team

This interactive workshop uses a Jeopardy-style game format to engage participants in learning about safer sex practices, STI prevention, and sexual health resources. Designed to be both fun and educational, the session will cover essential topics including barrier methods, STI facts and myths, testing and treatment, communication in relationships, and how our values guide sexual decision-making. Participants will work in teams to answer questions, problemsolve real-life scenarios, and connect sexual health knowledge to personal and community values such as respect, honesty, and responsibility.

By combining evidence-based information with values-based reflection, the workshop encourages students to see safer sex not only as a matter of health but also as an expression of living authentically in alignment with what matters most to them. The competitive, game-show format ensures active learning, breaks down stigma, and fosters open conversation in a supportive environment. Participants will leave with practical skills, myth-busting knowledge, and a clearer understanding of how safer sex practices reflect and reinforce the kind of world we want to help create.

Brown 139 Home for the Holidays

Waniya Hussain, Stetson University Maddie Weise, Stetson University Issah Abdullah, Stetson University Lua Hancock, Stetson University

This interactive workshop, *Home for the Holidays: Conversations that Connect Across Values*, invites participants to explore the role of values in shaping dialogue with those closest to us. Using familiar holiday and family dinner scenarios, we will examine how differing perspectives can create both tension and opportunities for deeper understanding. Through reflective activities, games, and structured discussion, participants will engage in self-discovery while practicing skills for navigating difficult conversations. The session will balance individual reflection with group dialogue to encourage participants to consider how their values have evolved over time, how they influence relationships, and how they can remain authentic while respecting differences. By the end of the workshop, participants will leave with strategies to manage value-based disagreements, foster empathy, and strengthen connections across divides.

Brown 140 Aligning Purpose and Generational Intelligence: Cultivating Leadership That Lets Life Speak

Alicia Scott, Stetson University Rina Arroyo, Stetson University

This interactive workshop explores how leaders and emerging professionals can align their values, purpose, and generational perspectives to create thriving, resilient communities. Participants will examine the intersection of Generational Intelligence (understanding how multiple generations collaborate and lead together) and Workplace Spirituality (finding meaning, purpose, and connection in work and service). Through guided reflection, case studies, and facilitated dialogue, attendees will discover practical tools to overcome intergenerational disconnect, foster inclusion, and strengthen leadership rooted in authenticity.

Brown 234 Purposeful Paths: Exploring Values-Based Leadership in All Disciplines Natalie Bittles, *Health Professions Advisor*

In every field—from the arts to engineering, business to biology—students are faced with choices that shape not only their careers but also the kind of world they help create. This interactive workshop invites participants from all majors to explore how their personal values can guide their academic, professional, and civic lives. Through reflective exercises, collaborative discussions, and real-world scenarios, attendees will identify their core values and examine how these



influence their decisions, relationships, and leadership style. Participants will engage with ethical dilemmas and leadership challenges relevant to diverse disciplines, and leave with a personalized action plan for living and leading with integrity. Bonding Over Baking: The Science Behind the Sweetness

Baking is more than a creative pastime—it is a living laboratory where chemistry and community intersect. For Stetson University's Values Day, the American Chemical Society (ACS) Student Chapter and the Baking Club are partnering to host an interactive workshop that brings science to life through the art of baking. Participants will engage in a hands-on baking activity that highlights the chemical principles behind everyday ingredients, from the role of baking powder and yeast in making dough rise to the Maillard reaction that gives bread and cookies their golden-brown color. Beyond mixing, measuring, and tasting, the session emphasizes how food connects people across cultures and traditions, aligning with Stetson's commitment to curiosity, community, and holistic learning. This workshop offers a unique opportunity for students to explore the balance between scientific inquiry and creative expression while working together to produce—and enjoy—delicious treats. By combining the rigor of chemistry with the joy of baking, the event invites participants to see science not only as an academic pursuit, but as a shared human experience that nourishes both mind and body.

Stetson has just launched a new Minor in Civic & Social Responsibility, which allows students to integrate academic study of social justice issues with hands-on community engagement. This workshop will provide an overview of the minor's requirements and community opportunities and allow students to think about how the minor could allow them to deepen their commitments and expand their leadership skills.

Sage 257 Breaking the Cycle: Real Talk and Recovery Strategies for Substance (4:15PM – Wellness

4:50PM) Fronk Scholars, Stetson University **35-min**

This session provides a comprehensive, interactive exploration of substance use, recovery, and wellness through the lens of values-based coping strategies. Participants will be introduced to Fronk, community partners, and key resources available for addiction recovery and health promotion. The core of the session consists of 3-4 interactive tables, each focused on a different substance— Tobacco, Fentanyl, and Percocet—detailing what the drug is, its side effects, and engaging attendees in hands-on learning activities. Through these tables, participants gain practical knowledge about the physical and mental impacts of each drug and reflect on personal values that can support healthier choices. The session concludes with a 10-minute recap that presents a tailored support plan linked to one of the Health & Wellness pillars, mental health and values-based coping, physical wellness as self-care, addiction recovery and values reconstruction, or healthy relationships and boundary setting. Attendees are invited to share feedback and insights, fostering community dialogue and empowerment. This format promotes active learning, encouraging participants to internalize information and apply it meaningfully to their lives.

Sage 257 Values in Action: Creating Your Vision Board for Authentic Living

Our values guide our choices, shape our relationships, and influence the kind of world we seek to build. Yet too often, values remain abstract ideals rather than daily practices. This interactive workshop uses the creative process of building a Values Vision Board to help participants clarify their core values and daily actions to live out those values. Participants will reflect on the values most important to them, translate those values into visual representations through collage, and leave with a tangible piece of art that can serve as a daily reminder of how to "let your life speak." Together, we will consider what authentic living looks like when grounded in values, and how we as a community can live our shared values more fully.

Native plants and landscapes help our environment stay strong and healthy, and one of the ways that we connect to these landscapes is through artistic exploration. At the Sandra Stetson Aquatic Center, the Bartram Trail and Gardens serve as a hands-on space where visitors can see the benefits of native landscaping, discover different uses for the plants grown there, and immerse themselves in the history of the region through the Beresford Mural. During the workshop at the Rinker Environmental Learning Center, participants will connect to the native Florida landscape by exploring local plants from the Sandra Stetson Aquatic Center that can be used to dye textiles, and then gain hands-on knowledge on how to use pre-made natural dyes from plants by making their own tie-dyed bandanna.

Behind the Big Camera is a personal documentary that follows my journey as an international student and filmmaker, capturing the challenges, growth, and discoveries that shaped my path. Through storytelling and behind-the-scenes moments, the film highlights resilience, purpose, and the importance of community in shaping identity. Its connection to Values Day lies in its focus on authenticity, service, and personal growth, reminding us that our values not only guide who we are but also how we use our gifts to impact others.

Postcards from Canaveral (Documentary) Run time 26 minutes Nathan Wolek, Stetson University

This video documentary about Canaveral National Seashore is told in two parts. Part one tells the story of Young Sound Seekers, a community partnership designed to create opportunities for visually-impaired youth with our public lands. It compiles interviews with the people involved who each talk about what they will take away from the experience. Part two explores the seashore through its soundscape, both above and below the water's surface. It gathers the sounds of Canaveral's waves, wind, and wildlife to present a guided audio tour narrated by some of the Young Sound Seekers. The audience will leave with a better understanding of why the soundscape at Canaveral should be treasured and protected.

After graduating from Harvard, Bryan Stevenson heads to Alabama to defend those wrongly condemned or those not afforded proper representation. One of his first cases is that of Walter McMillian, who is sentenced to die in 1987 for the murder of an 18-year-old girl, despite evidence proving his innocence. In the years that follow, Stevenson encounters racism and legal and political maneuverings as he tirelessly fights for McMillian's life.
