Currently home to the Religious Studies department, Allen Hall was built in 1950 by the Florida Baptist Convention at a time when the university had an affiliation with the Baptist denomination, which ended in the early 1990's.

The Carlton Student Union (CUB) serves as the center for student life on campus supporting students throughout their college experience. The CUB offers students multiple study and lounge locations, and provides four different food options to choose from.



Davis Hall was constructed in 1967 with the intention of being a new home to the business school, but is now home to several academic programs within the College of Arts and Sciences.



The duPont-Ball Library, the oldest federal depository in Florida, was built in 1964 and was extensively renovated in 1999. It now is home for the Innovation Center with 3D printing, the Writing Center, and the Hollis Family Student Success Center on the second floor.



Elizabeth Hall was the first major building on campus by university benefactor and namesake John B. Stetson, who named the building after his wife, Elizabeth Stetson. Today, Elizabeth Hall is home to the College of Arts and Sciences and also houses offices and classrooms.



Opened in 2009, the Homer and Dolly Hand Art Center houses the university's extensive art collection by Modernist painter Oscar Bluemner (1867-1938). It includes two galleries, one to exhibit the Vera Bluemner Kouba Collection and other works from the university's permanent art collection, and also includes special student juried art exhibitions.

The Cross-Cultural Center (Tri-C) is a second home and resource center for students from diverse social identities including race and ethnicity, sexuality, religion, socioeconomic status and ability.



Honoring alumnus Gary A. Meadows '59, the Meadows Alumni House is a welcome center for Stetson Alumni and houses the staff from the Offices of Alumni Engagement and Annual Giving.



The recreational and wellness hub of campus life and club sports, the Hollis Center features an outdoor swimming pool, gymnasium (Rinker Field House), a lounge and weight, fitness, activity and game rooms. The center's name honors the Hollis family. Four generation of the family have been involved in the life of Stetson University.



The Eugene M. and Christine Lynn Business Center (LBC) is Stetson University's and Florida's first LEED-certified building. The School of Business Administration building features state-of-the-art technology and is home to the Roland George Investments Program, the Centurion Sales Program, and the Entrepreneurship and Accounting Programs.



Brown Hall, constructed throughout 2023 was funded to create spaces that will allow ideas and learning to evolve into ground-breaking discoveries and innovative pedagogy. It is now home to the Center of Optimal Health Across Lifespan, Environmental Science and Studies, and much more.



Home to one of the finest undergraduate music schools in the country, students are educated by artist faculty, using cutting-edge music technology that provides firstclass performing opportunities in symphony orchestra, band, choirs, opera, musical theater, jazz, chamber music and solo.



The Sage Science Center is home to Stetson's Biology, Chemistry and Physics departments. The building was recently renovated to include exhibition spaces for undergraduate research, larger laboratory study areas and state-of-the-art technology.



DeLand Hall opened on Oct. 13, 1884, making it the oldest building in Florida that has been in continuous use for higher education. It was the first academic building at Stetson's DeLand campus.



The RELC is a space constructed to complement the Earth- and environmental-science mission of the Gillespie Museum. The space is used by local students, environmental groups and Stetson students for presentations, demonstrations, meetings, lectures, workshops and special events.



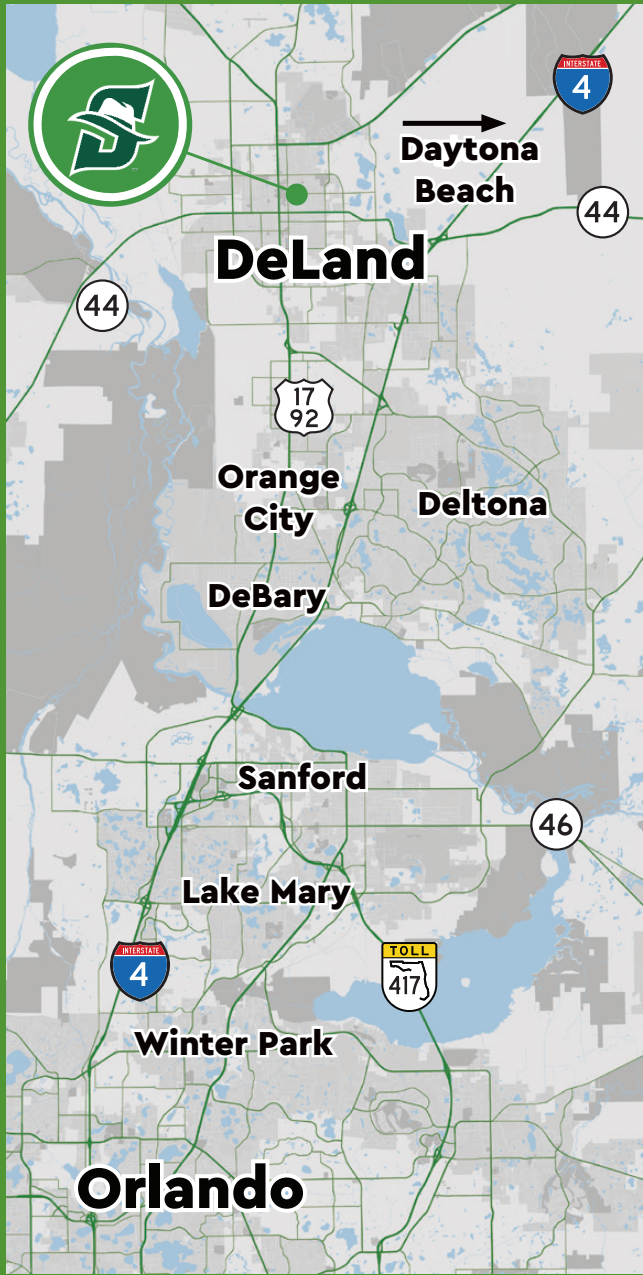
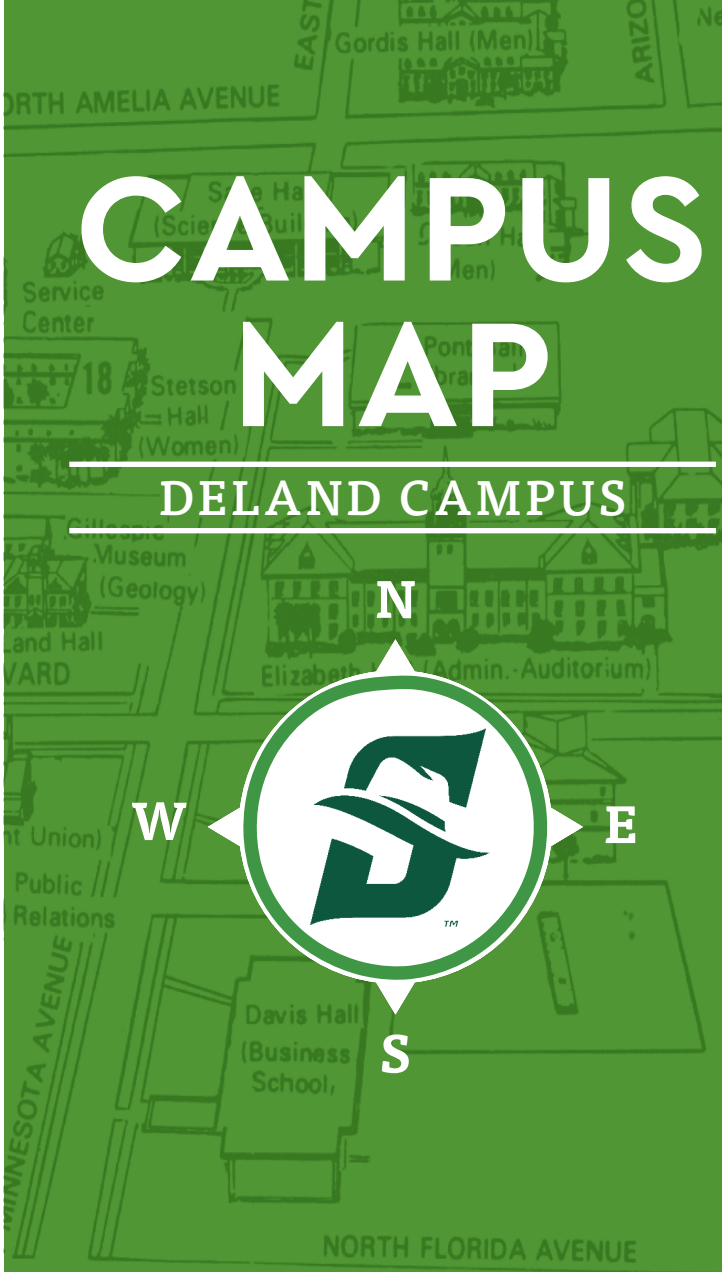
Flagler Hall was financed and built in 1902 by railway magnate Henry M. Flagler. What originally housed the engineering program and Florida's first law school is now home for departments in the College of Arts and Sciences.



The new, three-story, 24,000 square-foot Marshall and Vera Lea Rinker Welcome Center welcomes our prospective students and their parents to campus, assisting current students and welcoming alumni back to campus.



Built in 1908, Sampson Hall is one of the most architecturally significant buildings on campus. Partially funded by grants from Andrew Carnegie and Elizabeth Stetson, the building includes classrooms for Art, Modern Languages, American Studies, and art studios.



A Long History of Significance

New York entrepreneur Henry A. DeLand played a leading role in establishing the city of DeLand and founded the university as DeLand Academy in 1876. Thirteen students started classes in a rented building in 1883. The following year, Mr. DeLand erected a building at the corner of Woodland Boulevard and Minnesota Avenue to house classrooms and administrative offices. That building, now known as DeLand Hall, is the oldest building in Florida to be used continuously for higher education. After experiencing financial difficulties in the late 1880s, Mr. DeLand found it impossible to support the university. He turned to Philadelphia hatmaker John Batterson Stetson, who had recently built a winter home in DeLand. Mr. Stetson provided much-needed funding for the new institution, and in 1887, John B. Stetson was elected to the university's Board of Trustees. In 1889, the institution was renamed in his honor as Stetson University.
