## Writing Center Handouts

### **ASA (American Sociological Association) Style**

The American Sociology Association Style is commonly used for citations in sociology.

#### **General Guidelines**

- Double-space typed papers, using 12 pt. font. Margins should be 1.25" on all sides unless specified by the professor.
- Title pages should have a full title, authors' names (including institutions), and a complete word count of the document.
- If including an abstract, it should be one paragraph between 150–200 words in length and include key words.

#### **In-Text Citations**

- Cited material that is directly quoted requires citations that include author, year, and page number. In the citation, the page number follows the year after a colon (there are not spaces between year, colon, and page).
  - Ex: According to this handout, "When research is quoted in an ASA style paper, that material must include proper citation" (Author 2017:1).
- Not directly quoted material just needs the author and the year.
- When citing works that do not have authors (individuals or organization), use the full title in the text or a shortened one/two-worded title in the parenthetical citation.
- For research conducted by 2 authors, name both authors separated by "and" in the text and parenthetical citation.
  - Ex: (Author and Writer 2017)
- et al. use for citing research involving 4 or more authors; and, subsequent mentions of 3 authors.
  - Ex: (Author et al. 2017)

#### References Page

- Order entries alphabetically and center "REFERENCES" at the top of the page; indent the second and following lines.
- Examples:
  - o Books Last, First, and Second Author. Year. Title in Title Caps. City: Publisher.
  - Journal Last, First, and Second Author. Year. "Titles Are Written in Title Case." Journal
     Name in Title Case volume:page-page. [or volume (issues) :page-page]
  - e-Journal Last, First, and Second Author. Year. "Title." Article, volume (issue), page–page.

  - Web page Author or Organization. Year. "Webpage or Article Title." Retrieved Jan. 1, 2017 (http://url.com).
