## Ethical AI Use in Writing - A Student Guide to Artificial Intelligence

#### 1. Check the Syllabus!

- Always review your professor's guidelines on AI use in the classroom
  - Some courses may permit AI for brainstorming or research, while others may restrict its use.

### 2. Use AI to Assist, Not Replace Your Work

Al can serve as a valuable tool in your writing process, but it should never overshadow your voice or ideas. Here are a few ethical ways to use AI:

- **Brainstorming:** To help you come up with ideas or refine your thesis.
- **Organizing:** To structure your paper, improving clarity and flow.
- Understanding Concepts: To help explain complex concepts in simpler terms.
- **Helping with Language Accuracy:** To identify issues in language such as grammar or spelling and suggest revisions.

**Be mindful not to overuse AI**, or you might miss out on developing important skills such as critical thinking, problem-solving, and creative expression.

**Avoid:** Letting AI write full paragraphs or entire sections for you. Your voice, ideas, and originality are essential.

#### 3. Always Cite AI Contributions

If AI tools helped you during your writing process, you must acknowledge their contributions. Here's how:

- **Direct Al Output:** If you include texts generated by Al, cite the tool you used (ask your professor for citation style).
- **Assistance:** Even if AI helped you with brainstorming or structure, it's good practice to mention this in your paper.

Failing to give credit can be considered *plagiarism*, so always err on the side of transparency.

#### 4. Review and Edit Al-Generated Content

Al tools aren't perfect—they may produce incorrect or biased information. After using Al, be sure to:

- **Review:** Carefully read and fact-check content.
- **Brainstorm:** Add your own insights and analysis.
- Revise: Proofread your paper before submitting. Make sure your writerly voice shines through!
